Academic advising is mandatory for all incoming freshmen. **Advising is required for your first two semesters at the university.** We encourage you to engage in conversation with your academic advisor to determine the coursework appropriate for your degree program. This handbook provides suggestions from our faculty in each department regarding the courses in which you should enroll during your first two semesters at UNR. An advising hold has been placed on your record, which will be removed after you have met with an advisor. You will then register for your classes, beginning at a designated day and time, which is listed in the University's Class Schedule at <http://www.ss.unr.edu/records/sched.asp>.

Math and English placement is extremely important. Please carefully review your ACT or SAT scores to determine the proper course in which you should enroll.

We also encourage you to make a habit of reading the course description for each course you wish to take, before you enroll in the course. This information is found in the General Catalog available on-line at <http://www.ss.unr.edu/records/catalog.asp>. The course description will also list any prerequisites that you need to complete before enrolling in a particular course. Be sure to carefully read through your Wolf Pack Advising Manual! As you read this manual, you may need to refer back for more information.

You have many resources available to you in the College of Liberal Arts. You will be assigned an academic advisor in your major area of study. Most of our programs also require a minor area of study. You will have an additional advisor to discuss your coursework in pursuit of your minor. In addition, the Dean's office in the College of Liberal Arts also employs two full-time professional advisors to assist you regarding all aspects of academic advising. Foreign Language Placement Guide

Most majors in the College of Liberal Arts require completion of foreign language classes. There are several ways you may complete your foreign language requirement.

- Complete a fourth-semester (212 level) college course in a foreign language.
- Complete two semesters in Latin (LAT 111 and 112) and two semesters of Greek (GRE 111 and 112).
- Complete a fourth-semester course in American Sign Language (AM 148).
- Demonstrate proficiency through placement examination or other means through the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures.
- Show transcript evidence of successful completion of a fourth year high school language course. All four years of language classes must be in the same language in order to fulfill the language requirement.
- Participate and complete pre-approved language courses in a studies abroad program. Language courses must be pre-approved in order for the requirement to be fulfilled.

Placement Information

Course numbers for most foreign languages are 111, 112, 211, 212. American Sign Language courses are numbered 145, 146, 147, and 148. Basque language courses are numbered 101, 102, 203, and 204.

Register in 111, AM 145, or BASQ 101 if ...

- You have never taken this language before
- You have completed one year or less of this language in high school
- You did not pass this course before

Register in 112, AM 146, or BASQ 102 if ...

- You successfully passed 111, AM 145, or BASQ 101
- You successfully completed one to two years of this language in high school

Register in 211, AM 147, or BASQ 203 if ...

- You successfully passed 112, AM 146, or BASQ 102
- You successfully completed two to three years of this language in high school

Register in 212, AM 148, or BASQ 204 if ...

- You successfully passed 211, AM 147, or BASQ 203
- You successfully completed three to three and one-half years of this language in high school

Credit for Advanced Placement Exams

Advanced Placement Examinations offered by the College Board (CBAPE) are for students in high school. University of Nevada, Reno Office of Admissions and Records grants college credit (assigning a grade of “S”) for scores of 3, 4, or 5 as specified in the table below, upon receipt of an official score report from the College Board and a satisfactory essay when required.

Those students who successfully complete CBAPE examinations in French, German, Latin, or Spanish satisfy the foreign language requirement in the colleges of Education, Liberal Arts, and Sciences.

INTD 151 FOUNDATIONS FOR DESIGN (4 credits)

Studio study of design principles, documents, graphic ideation and modeling; both two- and three-dimensional aspects are studied.

INTD 216 TEXTILES (3 credits)

Consumer orientation to textiles. Serviceability, concepts of durability, care, comfort and aesthetic appearance are used to evaluate textile alternatives for various end uses.

TRUCKEE MEADOWS COMMUNITY COLLEGE COURSE DESCRIPTIONS:

ADT 105 ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTING I (5 credits)

Basic techniques of architectural drafting. Use of drafting room equipment.

Emphasizes residential buildings and leads to completion of a full set of professional level working drawings. Four hours lecture and three hours lab.

AAD 125 CONSTRUCTION DRAWINGS AND DETAILING (3 credits)

Analysis of assembling and detailing for construction in the field of architecture and landscape architecture. Techniques for the production of construction details will be discussed and demonstrated. Visits to construction sites and professional offices.

CADD 100 INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTER-AIDED DRAFTING (3 - 4 credits)

Prerequisite: DFT 100 prior to or concurrent with CADD 100. Introduction to the basic capabilities of a Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) system. Includes appropriate terminology, basic system design, typical hardware and software and applicable commands. Students will draw and solve drafting problems on a CAD system.

WESTERN NEVADA COMMUNITY COLLEGE COURSE DESCRIPTIONS:

CADD 100 INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTER AIDED DRAFTING

3 credits. Prerequisite: recommend DFT 100 and COT 204 or equivalent experience; or consent of instructor; may be taken concurrently.

Uses AutoCAD software to produce working drawings. Emphasizes constructing and editing two-dimensional geometry and placing drawing annotation.

CADD 120B ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTING I (3 credits)

Prerequisite: CADD 100 or equivalent experience.

Stresses blueprint reading skills. Introduces residential working drawing concepts leading to a full set of professional level working drawings..

ECON 102 PRINCIPLES OF MICROECONOMICS (3 credits)

Introductory analysis of price determination, resource allocation, market structure, consumer behavior, producer behavior, market failure and government failure. Economic approaches to social issues and policy. Prerequisite: MATH 120 or equivalent proficiency; or co-requisite of MATH 126 or higher.

ECON 103 PRINCIPLES OF MACROECONOMICS (3 credits)

Introductory analysis of how markets and governments interact to determine an economy's output, employment, income, interest rate, wage, price, and trade balance levels over time. Prerequisite: ECON 102.

IAFF 100 GLOBAL STUDIES (3 credits)

Introduction to the concepts and methods used to study human interaction and changing modes of interdependence; researching international publications; exploring academic specializations and career opportunities.

PSY 101 GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY (3 credits)

Presents psychology as a science concerned with the actions of organisms in a social and cultural context.

Sections 001-005 utilize a self-paced, mastery model consisting of frequent quizzing and discussion sessions. Students are enabled to progress through the course faster (mid-semester) than a normal pace (the end of one semester). Discussion sessions are offered five days a week, 12 hours per day by advanced graduate students to accommodate each student's schedule.

Sections 006-014 use the traditional method of instruction consisting of formal lectures taught by a faculty member in the Department of Psychology on Mondays and Wednesdays. Small discussion classes are offered on Thursdays or Fridays (as indicated in the course schedule) by an advanced graduate student. Since this approach is based on the traditional method in college teaching, further elaboration is not necessary.

PSY 103 INTRODUCTION TO PSYCHOLOGY AS A NATURAL SCIENCE (3 credits)

Measurement of actions of individual biological organisms acting in and upon an environment.

SOC 207 INTRODUCTION TO SOCIOLOGICAL THEORY (3 credits)

Examination of the works of classical and contemporary social theorists of the 19th and 20th centuries. Prerequisite: SOC 101.

SOC 210 INTRODUCTION TO STATISTICAL METHODS (3 credits)

Statistical methods applicable to the analysis, interpretation, and presentation of sociological data. Prerequisite: SOC 101; must have completed the university core requirements for mathematics.
