# WATER AND WEEDS top Nevada agriculture issues

Water and weeds are top concerns for Nevada agriculture producers, according to a statewide survey conducted by University of Nevada Cooperative Extension.

"Agriculture producers have set the agenda for Cooperative Extension's agriculture research and educational programs for the next few years," said Lyon County extension educator and University professor Loretta Singletary, who conducted the survey and analyzed the results.

**Top priorities in order of importance were:**

1. Legal considerations for water rights protection (91%)
2. Impacts of water transfers within and outside basins (89%)
3. Impacts of water rights sales (87%)
4. Impacts of environmental regulations on water use (83%)
5. Noxious weed identification and control (83%)
